Involving citizens, and a broad range of stakeholders and beneficiaries from the government, private and non-profit sectors, regularly and directly is one of the key components in project design, development, and implementation process.

Traditional top-down approach to a project implementation have increasingly lost public participation and support and been replaced with more deliberative, inclusive and communicative with the local people.
